




In 1961 the Arts Council showed at the Tate Gallery the first large-scale exhibition of contemporary Yugoslav painting and sculpture to be seen in this country since the war. We are now delighted to welcome a second exhibition from Yugoslavia, which gives us the opportunity to see what is being done in the field of contemporary sculpture.

We are most grateful to the Commission for Cultural Relations with Foreign Countries in Belgrade who, in cooperation with the Artists' Union, have promoted and sponsored this exhibition. We are particularly grateful to Mr Slavoljub Stanković of the Yugoslav Artists' Union who has personally devoted so much time and energy to organising the exhibition and selecting the works with our agreement. We also thank Dr Katerina Ambrozić who has kindly written an Introductory Note to the catalogue.

There were difficult decisions to take in choosing from a wealth of material. No attempt was made on the one hand to make the exhibition comprehensive, or on the other, to concentrate on any particular tendency or age group; the older generation is well represented along with the more experimental work of the younger scupltors. This accords with the climate of critical opinion in Yugoslavia where maturity is at least as highly prized as innovation.

We extend our sincere thanks to H.E. Mr Dobrivoje Vidic, Yugoslav Ambassador in London, who, like his predecessor Mr Ivo Sarajcic, has given the warmest support to this project: and to Mr Milan Zupan, Counsellor at the Yugoslav Embassy in London, for his valued assistance.

Robin Campbell Director of Art Arts Council There are many ways of working towards an understanding between peoples, but surely one of the greatest contributions can be through cultural heritage, contemporary trends and values, and of course the artistic achievements of the different nations. Great Britain and Yugoslavia have for several years been working towards this aim through a highly successful exchange of ideas on these topics. This has enabled the people of both countries to become aware of the various aspects of the development of each other's cultural life.

This exhibition of modern Yugoslav scuplture, organised by the Commission for Cultural Relations with Foreign Countries in co-operation with the Arts Council of Great Britain, follows immediately on the signature of a programme for cultural co-operation between the two countries for the years 1970 and 1971. This programme offers new opportunities for further co-operation and better understanding. The purpose of the exhibition is to acquaint the British public with the recent achievements of Yugoslav artists in the sphere of sculpture – a field of activity where British artists in particular have excelled.

Although exhibitions such as this (however comprehensive the selection) can never give a complete picture of the whole, we hope that visitors will be able to learn something of the fundamental aesthetic and thematic preoccupations of Yugoslav artists, some of whom are known outside Yugoslavia, and particularly in Britain.

We believe that in this wide range of endeavour on the part of Yugoslav artists, the British public will be able to discover the reflection of a strong artistic tradition and intensive creative activity, which in its various forms seeks above all to express itself in the language of contemporary art.

We hope that this exhibition of modern Yugoslav sculpture will awaken a wider interest in the art and culture of the peoples of Yugoslavia and that it will herald a new phase in the cultural exchange which has seen such positive results in recent years.

We take this opportunity of thanking the Arts Council of Great Britain and all those who have made this exhibition possible.

Introduction

This exhibition of contemporary Yugoslav sculpture aims at presenting the work of older sculptors at the height of their careers, and new departures by the younger generation.

With a group of twenty-one sculptors the exhibition cannot attempt to give a complete picture of sculpture in Yugoslavia. It is rather in the nature of a homage to Great Britain, whose sculptors have opened up new directions in the development of twentieth century art. In addition the people of Yugoslavia remember with gratitude two outstanding events, the Henry Moore exhibition in 1955 and the lectures by Herbert Read during his visit to Yugoslavia. This present exhibition covers three generations from the main cultural centres of Yugoslavia and surveys many of the trends in sculpture of the last decade. There is a wide range of styles and exchange of ideas which have led artists to use modern materials and processes.

Contemporary Yugoslav sculpture shows a variety of approaches by artists not all of whom are included in this exhibition. The following brief survey attempts to define the different styles.

Figurative art is expressed in highly formalised portraits and figures (*Nikola Janković, Milan Vergović, Mira Sandić, Ante Gržetić, Kolja Milunović) although some move further from studies of individuals (*Kosta Angeli Radovani), or else express a new poetic inspiration derived from the legends and myths of Yugoslavia (Nebojša Mitrić). Differing from traditional figurative representation is a new type of iconography presented as a tense, compact mass (Ksenija Kantoci, *Branko Ružić) and strong complex forms built up from figurative elements (Drago Tršar), or works of fantasy which are surrealist in quality (Zoran Petrović, *Afran Hozić). There are some works of more expressionist quality, which convey subjective feelings, emerging as symbols of man's tragic destiny (Nandor Glid, Vida Jocić), or seeking to suggest figures in simplified form (*Ivan Sabolić, Miša Popović, *Slavoljub Radojčić).

Enclosed forms, in the style of Brancusi or Arp, show two different trends in conception and method. Some works are organic, with smooth spherical surfaces suggesting their figurative origin (Slavoljub Stanković), or else they are dense masses with strong inner tension (*Olga Jančić). Other works

investigate the effect on spherical bodies which have been dissected and reassembled (*Oto Logo). In some cases the surfaces are partially coloured, or the degree of tension bursts the smooth outer case revealing the inner core (Franc Rotar). The direct quality of wood makes it a suitable material for shapes associated with the human form (Venija Vučinić, Dragica Čadež Lapajne) but increasing numbers of artists now use iron, aluminium, brass, etc., creating more diversification of shapes (*Dušan Džamonja, Stevan Luketić, Aleksandar Zarin).

Some mixed media sculpture relates to nature in a special way, when conceived as a kind of modern totem (*Jovan Kratohvil, *Slavko Tihec, *Peter Cerne), whether in iron (Hadji Boškov) or in wood built up vertically in tiers (*Šime Vulas). Some of the sculptors interested in Op Art have begun to incorporate light and movement in their work (*Vjenceslav Richter), including rotating illuminous plastics (Aleksandar Srnec) and reflecting metal discs (*Vojin Bakić).

There is a separate category of monumental works which are unusually evocative (*Olga Jevrić). The younger artists have directed their imagination towards relationships with object, space and with the spectator, and they have adopted new techniques, using modern materials and processes. Their objects, some of which are mobile, bring colour into space making the spectator participate in the changing environment (*Ljerka Šibenik, *Tomislav Kauzlarić, Tone Lapajne, *Jordan Grabul, Dušan Tršar, *Miroslav Šutej).

The considerable number of major awards which have been won by individual Yugoslav artists at international exhibitions confirms the existence of a thriving creative climate in Yugoslavia. The existing environment nourishes the sensibility of the artist and allows him to contribute through his work to international achievements, enriching them by the specific experience of his country and inheritance. The fact that all artists are open to new developments is the best guarantee of the vitality of the artistic life of a country.
